Actions and Outcomes	Indonesian Wave will contribute to the wish from young water professionals from various youth networks that expressed a clear demand for a youth-led ecosystem to engage and empower youth in the water sector, encompassing opportunities for learning and skill development, active participation in decision-making processes, and raising awareness to foster a generation of informed and proactive leaders. The demand indicated by the young water professionals revolves around several key objectives (3 A's):	

Access to job opportunities: there is a demand for access to job and learning opportunities both locally and internationally, recognizing the importance of learning from other countries (represented by "other Waves") through benchmarking. The acknowledgment that water issues transcend borders emphasizes the need for a global perspective in addressing these challenges. Existing capacity building programs like the Young Expert Programme (YEP) and the Dutch Training & Exposure Programme (DUTEP) are seen as contributing to this objective by providing avenues for learning and skill development.

Advocacy for youth involvement at board level: there is a demand for increased youth involvement at executive and board levels in the water sector. This reflects a desire to bring fresh perspectives, innovative ideas, and energy to decision-making processes, thereby ensuring that the voices of young people are heard and considered in shaping policies and strategies.

Awareness raising and empowerment: there is a demand to raise awareness about water-related issues and empower youth to take proactive roles in the water sector. This can be achieved through the implementation of Train the Trainer (ToT) concepts, which enable youth to become ambassadors and educators within their communities. Additionally, providing guest lectures in primary education (PE) and secondary education (SE) ensures that children are exposed to water-related topics from an early age, thereby shaping their attitudes and behaviors towards the sector. The inclusion of young children in the activities ensures the continuity of the youth-led ecosystem, as they are educated to become future leaders within the initiative.
