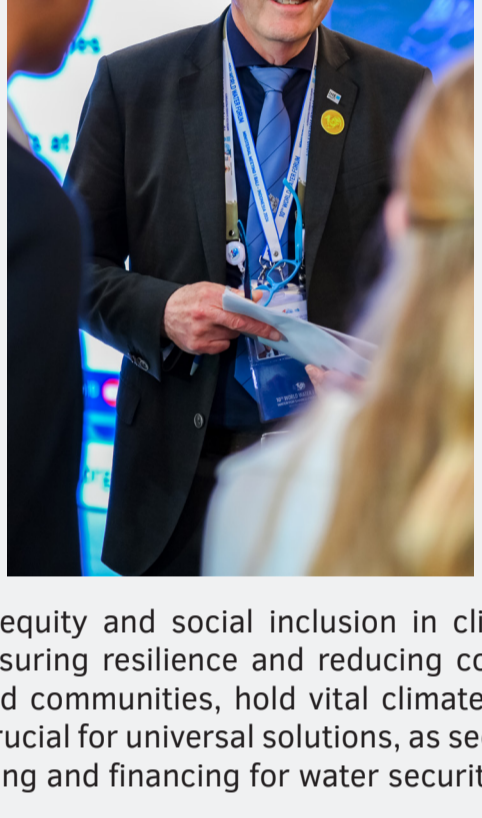
HIGHLIGHTS OF THE DAY 4

REGIONAL PROCESS SYNTHESIS



The all day long regional process outcome was an integrated view of the local and regional water priorities from four regions : Asia Pacific, the Mediterranean, the Americas, and Africa. Through the past year's preparation, four regional coordinating organizations have conducted discussions to identify local and regional water priorities. The synthesis of each regional was based on the sub-regional discussions and key deliverables, and based on discussion with the sub-regional coordination to incorporate their discussion.

DISCUSSIONS AND DELIBERATIONS



The session on ensuring gender equity and social inclusion in climate-resilient WASH, equity and inclusion must lead strategies, ensuring resilience and reducing conflict. Voices of affected groups, especially women and marginalized communities, hold vital climate knowledge. Integrating a strong GEDSI lens into WASH systems is crucial for universal solutions, as seen in Indonesia's CCRWI program, advocating inclusive decision-making and financing for water security.

The session on adapting to extreme hydrological events induced by climate change discussed disaster resilience through evacuation and preparation, involving all sectors. Key points included addressing uneven water distribution, enhancing forecasting and early warning systems, and integrating groundwater management. Emphasis was on prevention and preparedness, policy revisions, and resilient sanitation facilities to cope with climate-induced disasters.

The high-level panel on the Climate-Water-Energy-Food Ecosystem nexus emphasized the importance of alternative water sources (recycling, treatment, re-use), water use efficiency, governance, and transboundary water management. It highlighted the interconnections between water, food, energy, health, and education, calling for global attention and action from heads of state. Effective tools and regulations are needed to address water issues, and policymakers must recognize water's significance. Collaboration among food and water professionals, investors, researchers, and community groups is essential, despite trade-offs, to prevent adverse outcomes for all. The panel on nature for water advocated for nature-based solutions, requiring strong cooperation for sustainable water security.
